## 34 REARING & WEANED CALVES

10.30 am – Auctioneer: Richard Barrow Rearing Bulls to £340, Avg £176, Heifers to £150, Avg £106

A few more forward but generally not the best of quality sold to a very dear trade for what was on offer. The better calves traded over £300 to top of £340 (3 times) for a British Blue bull from M/s A Webb & Son & Simmental's from M/s R & T Andrews & M/s B Gough & Sons. Medium bulls traded between £150 - £200 & extreme dairy breeds £90 - £140.

Medium heifers were £130 - £150 with smaller, lesser sorts £50 - £100.

### **171 STORE CATTLE**

11.30 am – Auctioneer: Jon Pullin Avg: Steers £927 (202p/kg), Heifers £814 (191p/kg)

A very pleasing entry with cattle remaining short in many centres but generally today the quality was not that of recent weeks. Trade was still good but a shade easier on the second & third quality sorts.

The few stronger short-term steers were still a good trade and all Hereford's topping at £1310 (180p/kg) from Mrs G Greenaway, Cirencester & £1305 (201p/kg) from Mr S Topham, Apperley. The stronger medium-term steers were still a strong trade between £1100 - £1200 (210 – 230p/kg). The general medium-term steers were a shade more selective between £920 – £1000 (200 – 210p/kg). The younger steers were mostly general & lesser sorts trading between £650 - £800 (195 – 210p/kg).

Not too much strength in the heifers with the stronger medium-term heifers being mostly native breeds trading between £1000 - £1070 (185 – 205p/kg) topping at £1172 (188p/kg) for a Welsh Black from Mr D Denton, Cold Ash. Hereford heifers were £940 - £995 (198 – 207p/kg) from M/s S & R Cottrell, Grove. The general medium-term & younger sorts were £780 - £900 (180 – 190n/kg)

A few weaned calves saw British Blue steers (5 – 6mnths) to £700 (197p/kg) & £648 (249p/kg) from M/s D Candy & Son, Christian Malford.

An improved entry with a similar trade to last week which has held all week. Again, a mixed bag on offer with more lambs starting to go "lean & leggy" as they start to grow again. The better meated, tighter coated lambs traded between 250-260p/kg topping at 285p/kg £105.50 for 37kg from Mrs K Farmer. The general meat lambs traded between 240-245p/kg. A very good trade on the light lambs with the better sorts 255-270p/kg. The better medium weight lambs (44-48kg) traded between £115-£120 with the looser coated, leaner sorts £108-£110. The heavier lambs in demand but not too many better sorts on offer topping at £130 for 50kg from Mrs B Pullin with the general sorts £110-£115. Mrs B Pullin kindly donated a 38kg lamb to our charity which sold to £130 twice purchased by Mr J Pullin & Mr T Simpson.

The half meat & meat medium Suffolk & Continental ewes still selling well between £105 - £115. The strong meat Mules were £106 - £112 with stronger half meat sorts £90 - £100. ### SUCCESSION PLANNING

Succession planning can be one of the hardest discussions to have within a family, however can be one of the most important in order to make sure that the legacy of the farm and business can continue successfully into the future, along with the wishes of the deceased being met when they are sadly no longer around. Unfortunately, we are seeing time and time again that these plans are not being put in place, consequently having massive effects on finances, mentality and relationships.

### What problems can be caused without a sufficient plan being in place?

Family disputes, Unwanted persons claiming part or whole of the estate, Large inheritance tax bill, Not fulfilling tax reliefs available, Large capital gains tax bill, Land registry problems, Tenancy problems, Selling of whole or part of the holding, Splitting of the holding or farming business, Grant funding problems

The main areas to consider when thinking about putting together a succession plan: How and who owns the assets? Is the title(s) for property registered with the land registry?, Who occupies the land and buildings and on what basis/tenancy type?, What are the short-, medium- and long-term objectives of the farming business?, What role does each family member play now and likely to play in the future of the business?, What developments, skills or experience do the younger generation need to acquire?, Who will inherit/be transferred, what asset in the short, medium and long term?, What provisions will be made for those members not involved in the business?, What income does each party receive and require from the family business? Where will each member of the family live, now and in the future? Is there documentation in place for each party on their death? What happens if the people die in a different order to what was expected?

Succession planning takes time and is a personal process, with each plan having to be tailored to the parties and the farming business. Along with this, tax and law are very complicated matters and need to be approached in the correct manner. Therefore, investing time today and keeping a plan updated can far outweigh the unforeseen problems and larger costs in the future.
